

### A Report from the Chair and Senior Staff, 2014 - 2015

## "No significant learning occurs without a significant relationship." -Dr. James Comer

As we reflect on this past year, we can see that it really was a learning year and to do that it required a team that works together.

The Board focused in on creating a Business Continuity and Succession Plan. This required a great deal of information from all staff and very thoughtful deliberations by the directors. They have also been reviewing and revising all policies and procedures for the organization.

We had our long time staff member, Anne Ramsay, leave the organization to become an Employment and Training Consultant with the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities. Anne dedicated herself to the literacy field for over 25 years. Her knowledge and passion are missed.

We continued our work on the LBS Task Portal with QUILL Network supporting the development of tasks that relate directly to the OALCF examples.

A3 and the Employment Path was a research and development project we were contracted to do. Karen Morgan-Bowyer took the lead on this and developed an amazing resource for the field on how to extract information from films, broadcasts and presentations.

Our second phase of the Labour Market Project for the western region created a literacy screening tool for Employment Services, OW, ODSP and other agencies. To help develop and promote this tool we provided 4 training sessions to these agencies across Waterloo-Wellington. The training really highlighted how to "sell" literacy to clients who "just want to get a job."

We also worked on the committee to support ABEA in the development of "Financial Literacy – Workshop Series" funded by Trillium.

The Workforce Planning Board and Project READ jointly held Employment Ontario Expos in Waterloo, Guelph and Cambridge to help all program staff learn about each others programs.

Project READ also moved offices to 124 Sydney Street South, Kitchener. This was made possible by supports from MTCU and the generosity of K-W Habilitation.

We provided Bridges Out Of Poverty workshops in Hamilton and Niagara and Jane became certified in the Getting Ahead program.

Our staff is the hardest working group of dedicated individuals. They work together well as a team and are always there for each other. They always go above and beyond the call of duty.

The Directors of Project READ are amazing. They're innovative and thorough and we are lucky to have them volunteer their time to our organization.

## Professional Development Projects & Promotion

- In partnership with the Workforce Planning Board we held 3 Employment Ontario Expos:
  - Guelph-Wellington
  - Kitchener-Waterloo
  - Cambridge
- Provided 4 training workshops for Employment Service agencies on when and how to refer a client to LBS
   (2x Waterloo Region, 1x Guelph and 1x Wellington County)
- We provided a workshop on mental health
- We provided a workshop on PIAAC (Programme for the International Assessment of Adult Competencies)
- Held meetings with the Maple Leaf Action Centre
- Provided 4 Labour Market Project results webinars to practitioners
- Worked with western networks to have meetings with Western Region Manager, Mary Joe Friere and two of Premier Wynne's senior policy advisors on the need for funding in LBS
- A3 and the Employment Path Developed a levelled curriculum on teaching the OALCF Competency A. Find and Use Information A3. Extract info from films, broadcasts and presentations
- Task-based Activities Portal developed and reviewed various task sets for the portal based on the "Examples" given for each competency
- Labour Market Partnership Phase 2 developed a screening tool and guide for Employment Services and other agencies to help identify literacy needs and how to refer to a literacy program
- Ministry of Citizenship and Immigration further developed the grandparent workshops and delivered them in partnership with Waterloo Public Library and Waterloo Region Libraries







# Literacy Service Planning


- 1,645 adults (16+)
   participated in LBS
   training in Waterloo Wellington in 2014/15
- 41.2% were male and
   58.8% were female
- 48.2% of learners were under the age of 30 with math being a major request for upgrading
- 49.5% of our learners had less than a Grade 12 education, which shows that having a Grade 12 is not indicative of being literate
- We showed a 6.8% increase in referrals out to other programs (e.g. Employment Service Provider) and a 9% increase in referrals to community resources (e.g. health/ counselling services)




### Waterloo-Wellington Literacy Statistics









- 138 Ontario Works participants assessed & placed into Literacy and Basic Skills programs as well as other training and employment services









### Family Literacy Initiatives



- Since 2003, **571 parents and 779 preschool age children participated in Get Set Learn at 68 program locations** in Waterloo Region.
- In 2014, **46** parents and **53** preschool children participated in Get Set Learn family literacy program for families living on Ontario Works funded by the Region of Waterloo Social Services and delivered at community locations: Cambridge Self-Help Food Bank, Stanley Park Community Centre, and Mill-Courtland Community Centre.
- Impacts on families: Increased knowledge and skills about emergent literacy and home literacy activities; higher frequency of reading, writing and math activities at home; increased confidence & more positive attitudes towards learning and school; increased awareness of Essential Skills and how skills are used at work, home and in the community.
- Since 2008, **201 parents and 416 children have participated in Get Set Learn Afterschool (GSLA)** at 9 locations (8 elementary schools).
- In 2014 we delivered GSLA at Queen Elizabeth Public School in Kitchener.
- **92 grandparents** attended our family literacy workshop series for grandparents, *You and Your Grandchild: Learning Together in a Changing World*. These workshops were delivered in the City of Waterloo and rural areas with funding from the Ontario Seniors Community Grant Program, Ministry of Citizenship and Immigration.
- Involvement in local, collaborative initiatives: Alliance for Children and Youth; Early Literacy Alliance of Waterloo Region; Positive Parenting Committee; and the Children's Planning Table.
- Participation in the 17<sup>th</sup> Annual Family Literacy Day Celebration at Conestoga Mall on January 25, 2015
- **Family literacy volunteers contributed 180 hours** to our programs and events during 2014-15.
- We are hoping to **expand our Get Set Learn program in 2016-2017** through a Grow Grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation.
