Chair Executive Director Report, 2015 - 2016

2015/16

2015/16 was a difficult year in literacy with no new funds coming in the field. Core funding had not changed...for 15 years. The Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities' (currently called Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills Development) Network Development Fund grants had dried up to cover costs for other ministry programs that weren't even in the Literacy and Basic Skills portfolio. The Trillium Foundation was also in the process of redesigning their funding model and not accepting any grant proposals. And to top things off the federal government had stopped funding anything through its Office of Literacy and Essential Skills. It was a bleak time. All provincial literacy coalitions and three main national literacy organizations had to close their doors. LBS programs were struggling to keep their doors open and in some cases managers laid themselves off to help keep classes running! It is an example of dedication as to how all these programs stayed open. Project READ survived...continuously applying for grants and projects. This hard work paid off ¾ of the way through the year. We received a Grow Grant for our Get Set Learn program in December and a Seed Grant for developing a mental health guide for practitioners from the Trillium Foundation. The vision of the Board and Staff made survival possible.

The Board and Staff also worked on a new Strategic Plan for Project READ that helped us to redefine our Mission Statement, Vision and Values. Optimism reigned!





2016/2017

We continue_to supplement the work we do under the Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills Development through other sources. We were successful in receiving a Libro Prosperity Fund Grant to develop 24 Financial Literacy Task Sets for the LBS Learning Activities Portal. We also have a team from Leadership Waterloo Region developing a communications plan for us and helping us to implement some of the findings.

We provided the Wrap-Around Service Bus Tours in Waterloo and Wellington for literacy, employment services and social service members. This was done with the support of the Waterloo-Wellington-Dufferin Workforce Planning Board. The tour gave practitioners first hand knowledge of other services their clients may need including: debt management, mental health, legal supports and various community programs.

We are developing more and more partnerships to help support our programs and learners (poverty reduction strategy, community wellness, etc.). And continue to strive to have literacy recognized as an important need that must be resourced to create a community without poverty....that is safe....that is educated....that is employed.

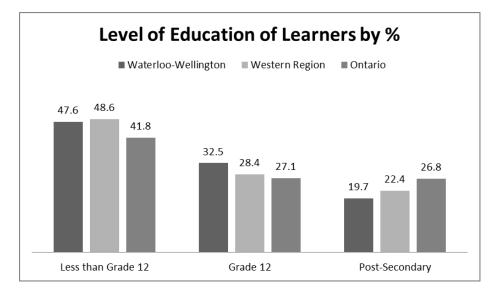

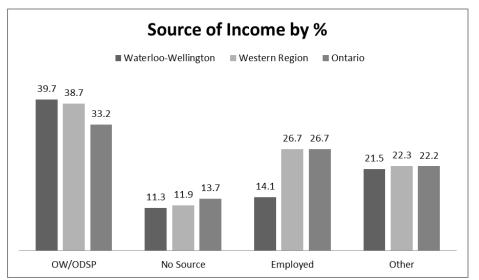
Literacy Service Planning

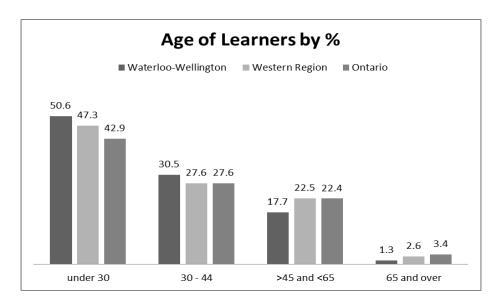
- 1,702 adults (16+)
 participated in LBS
 training in Waterloo Wellington in 2015/16
- 40.7% were male and
 59.2% were female
- 50.6% of learners were under the age of 30 with math being a major request for upgrading
- 47.6% of our learners had less than a Grade 12 education, which shows that having a Grade 12 is not indicative of being literate
- We showed a 2.6% increase in referrals out to other programs (e.g. Employment Service Provider) at a total of 26.3% which is 5.3% higher than the provincial average



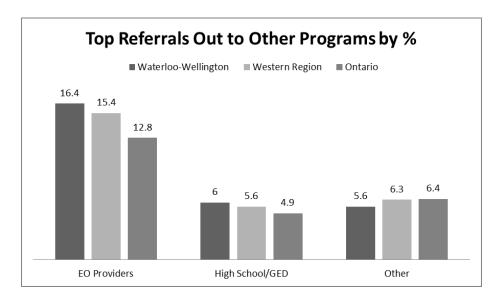
Waterloo-Wellington Literacy Statistics

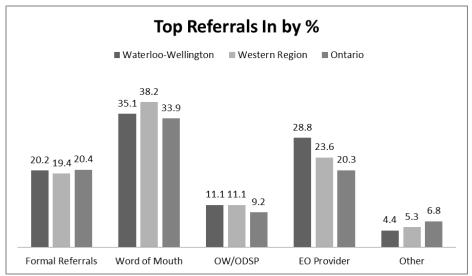


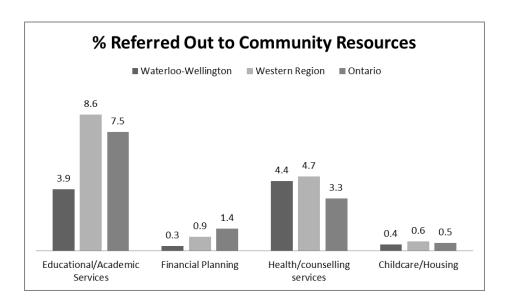


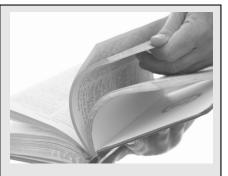


Waterloo-Wellington Literacy Statistics

Family Literacy Initiatives



- Since 2003, 617 parents and 833 preschool age children participated in Get Set Learn at 74 program locations in Waterloo Region.
- In 2015, **46** parents and **54** preschool children participated in Get Set Learn family literacy program for families living on Ontario Works or ODSP funded by the Region of Waterloo Social Services and delivered at community locations: Lang's, Stanley Park Community Centre, and Mill-Courtland Community Centre.
- Since 2008, **201 parents and 416 children have participated in Get Set Learn Afterschool (GSLA)** at 9 locations (8 elementary schools).
- Since 2013, 235 grandparents have participated in You and Your Grandchild: Learning Together in a Changing World, a program and workshop series for grandparents and grandchildren. In 2015, 32 grandparents attended our workshop series. These were held in Cambridge in partnership with The Idea Exchange with financial support of the Rotary Club of Cambridge North and the Rotary Club of Cambridge Sunrise.
- Impacts on families: Increased knowledge and skills about emergent literacy and home literacy activities; higher frequency of reading, writing and math activities at home; increased confidence & more positive attitudes towards learning and school; increased awareness of Essential Skills and how skills are used at work, home and in the community.
- Involvement in local, collaborative initiatives: Early Literacy Alliance of Waterloo Region; Positive Parenting Committee; and the Children's Planning Table.
- Participation in the 18th Annual Family Literacy Day Celebration
- We received a two-year grant for \$205,900 from the Ontario Trillium Foundation to expand our Get Set Learn program and create a plan for growth and sustainability into the future.
